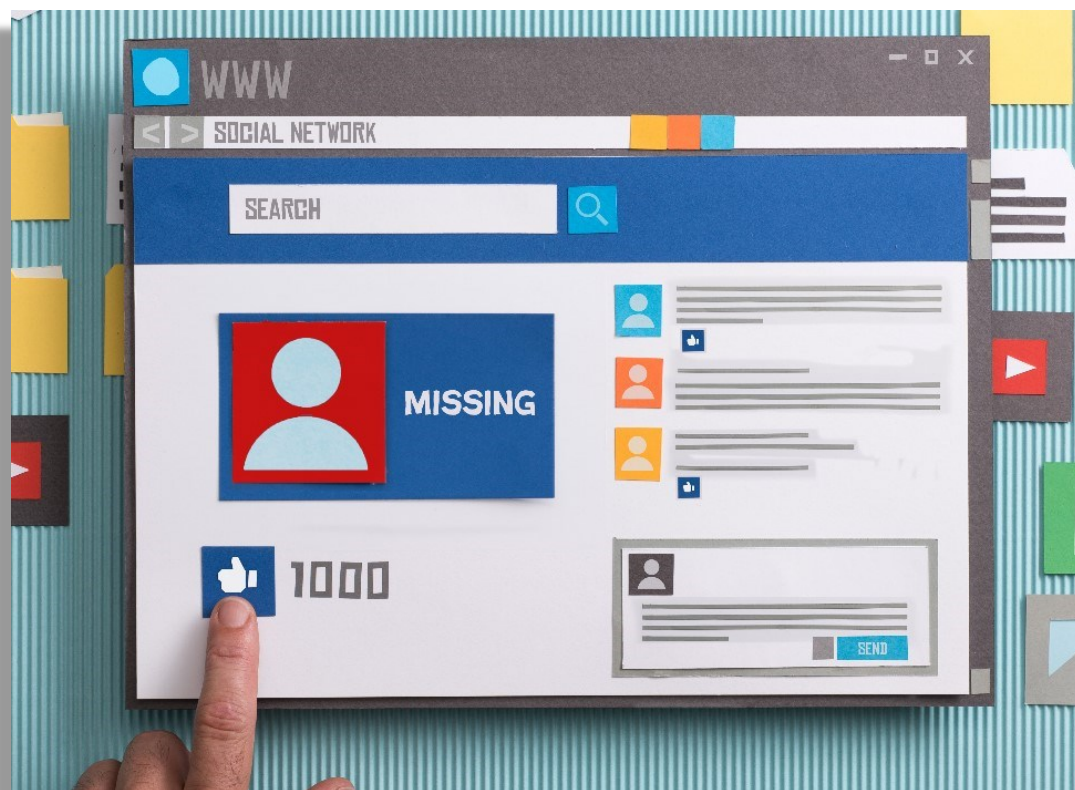

Spreading awareness for missing kids

Tips for recognizing fake missing posters

We all want to do our part to help reunite missing children with their loved ones. Sharing social media posts is an easy way to quickly spread the word that a child needs help. But while we want to believe in the benevolent spirit of people, it is becoming more common that fake posters are popping up featuring kids who are not missing. Sharing these fake posts can dilute the issue.

Missing Posters—real or fake?

NCMEC shares the following tips to help you decide when to click “share” and when to proceed with caution:

Good missing posters will include:

- A child’s name
- The date they went missing
- The location they are missing from
- Bonus: the law enforcement agency handling the case, along with their phone number or NCMEC’s 24/7 hotline, 1-800-THE-LOST

Look for red flags to spot misinformation:

- The information on the child does not come from NCMEC, and official law enforcement agency or another credible news source, such as your local or national news;
- The poster or post contains misspellings, improperly used words or errors in syntax;
- The post is not asking you to take the appropriate action or doesn’t share how you can take action.



Get Involved: CyberTipline

The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) [CyberTipline](https://www.cybertipline.org) is the nation’s centralized reporting system for the online exploitation of children. The public and electronic service providers can make reports of suspected online enticement of children for sexual acts, extra-familial child sexual molestation, child pornography, child sex tourism, child sex trafficking, unsolicited obscene materials sent to a child, misleading domain names, and misleading words or digital images on the internet.

NCMEC staff review each tip and work to find a potential location for the incident reported so that it may be made available to the appropriate law-enforcement agency for possible investigation. We also use the information from our CyberTipline reports to help shape our prevention and safety messages.

Guinevere is missing from French Lick, Indiana which is 105 miles southwest of Indianapolis and was last seen on Monday, September 25, 2023.

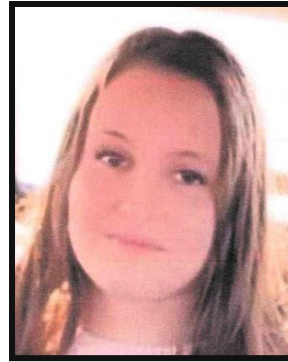

Valerie is missing from Arlington, Indiana which is 47 miles southeast of Indianapolis and was last seen on Wednesday, June 7, 2023.

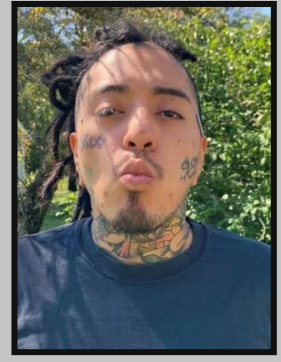

In the Spotlight

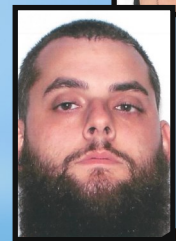



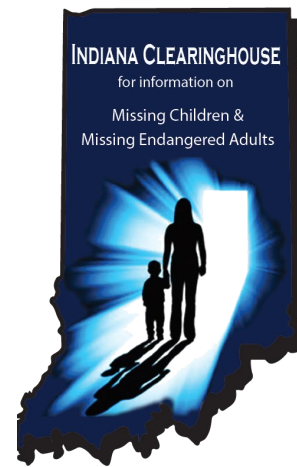

The Missing Person Bulletin is a valuable resource available for you to check and confirm if a person is identified as missing in the State of Indiana. The bulletin is updated daily Monday through Friday with information from the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) and the Indiana Data and Communication System (IDACS). Always check the date at the bottom of the page to confirm when the bulletin was last updated. If there is any doubt, feel free to call the Clearinghouse at 800-831-8953.

National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC)

The mission of the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children is to help find missing children, reduce child sexual exploitation, and prevent child victimization. They operate a 24/7 national hotline (1-800-THE-LOST) for tips and reports related to missing and sexually exploited children, create and distribute missing child posters, redistribute AMBER Alerts, operate the CyberTipline for child sexual exploitation, help locate victims of child sex trafficking, assist law enforcement with tracking non-compliant sex offenders, provide crisis intervention and counseling referrals, and ensure that victims of child sex trafficking have access to the recovery services and support they need.

National Runaway Safeline

The mission of the National Runaway Safeline is to help keep America's runaway, homeless, and at-risk youth safe and off the streets. NamUs is a national information clearinghouse and resource center for missing, unidentified, and unclaimed person cases across the United States. Funded and administered by the National Institute of Justice and managed through a cooperative agreement with the UNT Health Science Center in Fort Worth, Texas, all NamUs resources are provided at no cost to law enforcement, medical examiners, coroners, allied forensic professionals, and family members of missing persons.

Who we are



The Indiana General Assembly established the Indiana Clearinghouse for Information on Missing Children and Missing Endangered Adults in 2009. The Clearinghouse is intended to serve as the state central repository for all information on missing children and missing endangered adults from Indiana or believed to be in Indiana. The program is designed to collect, store, and disseminate information on missing children and missing and endangered adults. The Clearinghouse provides liaison among citizens, private organizations, and law enforcement agencies regarding missing children information.
